SPRING BREAK BLACK COLLEGE TOUR

Spring break is just around the corner. While this would usually mean a blissful week of sleeping in, hours of television, and 5 days without teachers, some students from Dayton View Campus and Dayton Liberty Campus will be spending their break a little differently.

On March 29 approximately 40 seventh and eighth graders from Dayton View Campus and Dayton Liberty Campus will be heading to North Carolina for the third annual Spring Break Black College Tour. From March 29th to April 2nd students will partake in a five day tour through some of the finest colleges North Carolina offers, including V

While the students might be on spring break, this trip isn't all fun and games. Each student will be responsible for documenting each school visit in a journal. Students must find out the cost of tuition, ACT and SAT score requirements, and write narratives describing what they liked and disliked about each school. The hope is that these journals won't just be another assignment, but a resource that students can reflect upon when it's time for them to choose a college.

In addition to offering students a chance to visit universities, the trip will also provides them with an opportunity to visit historic landmarks and museums.

"A lot of our students never see anything outside of Dayton" said Deborah Scales, Student Support Manager at

Dayton View Campus and the founder of the Spring Break Black College Tour. "We want
to open the students' minds and expose them to different places."

During past trips students have visited The Rosa Parks Museum, The Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Non-Violence, and the National Great Blacks in Wax Museum. This year's most anticipated historical stop is the International Civil Rights Museum in Greensboro, NC. This renovated Woolworth is home of the February 1, 1960 lunch counter sit-in and is now a museum dedicated to civil and human rights.

We wish the students and staff a safe journey and hope they enjoy this special trip; where students can start to look towards their own future while appreciating a very important past.



NEW SPONSORSHIP WEBSITE

FORDHAM'S TESTING WEBINAR

Wednesday, March 31, 2010

We'll be conducting a webinar on Wednesday, March 31 at 4:00 pm to review Ohio Achievement Assessment preparations including scheduling, materials, and basic logistics concerned with test security and monitoring. We'll also review recent rule book changes, and the Spring 2010 Schedule Change. OAC 3301-13-02 (A) (4) (b) was changed and approved. The new text:

The second test administration period each year shall begin not earlier than Monday of the week containing April twenty-fourth and the make-up testing shall be

completed by the Friday of the week following the regular test administration. A participating school may schedule the regular administration of the test on any day of this test administration period, but the regular administration of the test shall occur on the same day throughout all buildings of each participating school as defined in paragraph (A)(14) of rule 3301-13-01 of the Administrative Code.

There are conditions that **must** be followed:

- The starting date for each grade-level test administration **must** be the same district-wide.
- All schools within a district must test the same grade level content area on the same day.
- The testing sequence **must** be reading, mathematics and science.
- Any make-up test **may** be administered after the test has been initially administered to the entire grade level.
- The week of May 3 should be used for **make-up testing**, not initial testing, which should be done the weeks of April 19 and 26. Initial testing involves the entire grade level; make-up testing only involves individual students who were absent at the time of the initial testing. Please note that make-up tests may be given on the "in between" days if tests are administered on non-consecutive days.
- Scorable materials **must** be returned **no later than Friday, April 30; Monday, May 3; or Tuesday, May 4** (subject to the "rolling pickup" provision below). The return schedule for the initial test administration, excluding make-up testing, is based on K–12 school enrollment as follows: Fewer than 2,500 students: no later than Friday, April 30

Students placed first in the categories of Total Points, Best Robot, and Creativity; students placed second in Board Research Display, Research Paper, Research Journal, and Oral Presentation.
- * Amy Doerman, principal of the Dayton View Campus, has been invited to provide input to Ready, Set, Soar's Kindergarten readiness initiative. The initiative seeks to link pre-K programs with their area K-12 counterparts.
