PARENTAL SATISFACTION SURVEY RESULTS

February 2013















INTRODUCTION

From February 1–28, 2013, the **Black Alliance for Educational Options** and the **Louisiana Federation for Children** conducted a direct mail survey to evaluate the level of parental satisfaction with the Louisiana Scholarship Program (formally known as the Student Scholarships for Educational Excellence Program). As of February 2013, the Louisiana Department of Education reported **4,696** students were enrolled in the Louisiana Scholarship Program. Of the **4,696** surveys distributed, **1,244** surveys were returned for a **26.5** percent return rate. An eight to ten percent return rate is considered successful for direct mail surveys.

Survey Sample


This year's survey sample includes at least one survey from 82 of the 118 participating schools. Parents from 32 parishes are represented in the survey sample. Sixty-three percent of the surveys received are from parents of first-time scholarship recipients, with the other 37 percent representing parents of continuing students.



SURVEY RESULTS


Parental Satisfaction

Of the 1,244 surveys returned, 1,221 parents responded to the question: "Overall, how satisfied are you with your child's current school?"



Academic Performance

Of the 1,244 surveys returned, 1,242 parents responded to the question: "Are you happy with your child's academic progress at his/her scholarship school?"




Student Safety

Of the 1,244 surveys returned, 1,202 parents responded to the question: **"Does your child feel safe in his/her scholarship school?"**
